Congress Fails to Prevent Full 4.5% Medicare Payment Cut

The ACS was exceptionally disappointed to see that Congress neglected to act by fully stopping the impending Medicare payment cuts, set to go into effect on January 1, 2023. Appropriators from both parties released language for the omnibus spending bill for fiscal year 2023 early Tuesday morning, which reveals a 2.5% adjustment for the conversion factor in 2023—meaning a 2% cut will go into effect if there are no additional changes.

In addition, Congress set a low conversation factor adjustment for 2024, at only 1.25%, likely ensuring additional cuts in the future. Congress postponed the 4% PAYGO cuts until 2025.

The Surgical Care Coalition, a group of 14 professional organizations dedicated to improving surgical care and of which the ACS is a member, issued the following statement in response to Congress releasing the year-end spending legislation.

Finding Your Way Back To Fitness

Ah, yes, it's that time of year when the dreaded New Year's Resolutions begin to circulate. What's your New Year's Resolution? Why have one? If you plan to make a change to improve your overall well -being, that is great! Just remember, set your goals to be attainable. Setting over-ambitious goals will ultimately led to fitness burnout and hitting that brick wall by mid-January.



As busy surgeons, juggling multiple commitments of your time and energy, it is sometimes not easy to stay on track with your exercise routines and healthy habits. To get back on track, the folks at Kaiser Permanente share the following tips in their recent *Thrive at Work* publication:

Choose the Plan You Will Stick to: At the end of the day, your fitness goal needs to be realistic to be sustainable. For many, this requires a lot of trial and error. State with small goals then work towards a longer-term daily exercise habit. Whatever your fitness plan, it needs to be the one that you feel you can commit to. Just believing you can do it is half the battle and the first important step.

Incorporate Resistance Training: Building strength does not have to mean lifting weights or hitting the gym. There are plenty of resistance exercises that use the weight of your own body or portable

fitness bands. Muscle mass naturally declines as we age, so resistance training and building muscle helps counteract those effects by increasing your metabolism, preventing injuries, and improving your overall energy and mood. In addition to cardio, be sure to build strength as well.

Keep it Convenient: Research shows to make behavior changes stick, it needs to be a plan that is as easy as possible. When it comes to fitness, that may mean setting out workout gear before going to sleep, or stashing athletic shoes or whatever else you need to get moving in your vehicle. Some may find multi-tasking the way to go—remember treadmill, stand-up desks? Keep your fitness gear where it is in easy reach and convenient. This small trick will help reduce the excuse to stay put because it takes too long to gather everything together.
